UNIVERSITY OF MELBOURNE PROPOSAL: “AWI CLIMATE 2030 PROJECT”

1. Develop research collaborations between key research institutes in member universities
2. Establish a Project Steering Committee
 - Chair to report to AWI
 - At least one representative from Australasia, Southeast Asia, East Asia, North America, and Latin America.



UNIVERSITY OF MELBOURNE PROPOSAL: “AWI CLIMATE 2030 PROJECT”

3. Report by **May 2008** laying out the project research agenda
 - Address key issues of Climate Change
 - E.g. collaborative energy futures for the Pacific Rim, food and water issues.
 - Collaborating universities must have strong capabilities to develop co-ordinated research projects
 - Should involve developing and developed countries in the Pacific Rim
 - Interdisciplinary research aims
 - Strategy for engaging with decision makers in government, industry and civil society
 - If possible, highlight pilot research activities undertaken



UNIVERSITY OF MELBOURNE PROPOSAL: “AWI CLIMATE 2030 PROJECT”

4. Conditions to Launch the Project

- Each participating university to contribute USD\$10,000
 - ↳ Preferably at least 5 universities
 - ↳ Ideally with matching funds from AWI
- Participation of at least one Chinese university and at least one US university
- In principle University of Melbourne is willing to participate in such a collaboration and pledge USD\$10,000 in support
 - ↳ Under auspices of Climate Adaptation Science and Policy Steering Committee at University of Melbourne
